




POSITION OR SPARK AND THROTTLE LEVERS


The following chart to be used as a guide for the positions of the Spark and Fuel levers on the quadrant as situated on the steering column for various conditions for the vehicle operation.

Please remember these are only as a guide as your vehicle may operate slightly different.


- When starting the Model T Ford, the spark lever is fully retarded, the fuel lever is opened four or five notches.
- Position of the spark and fuel levers for running the engine when not driving the vehicle. This is the proper lever position for idling and coasting.
- For starting vehicle at low speed, advance the spark lever about five notches and then open the fuel four or five notches.
- 4. For speed of approximately 10 MPH,17 KPH in high gear, leave the spark advanced about five notches and open the fuel two or three notches.









 For speed of approximately 20 MPH, 33 KPH in high gear, leave the spark advanced about five notches and open the fuel five notches.

 seven notches and open the fuel seven

To maintain road speed advance the spark and fuel levers as far as they will go.


