I believe one of the most interesting things about our old car hobby is knowing some of the early history of the car, such as who bought it new, and when, because these cars for many were the first motor vehicle for the family that previously would have relied on horses and buggies for transport. The car opened up new frontiers of adventure, enabling neighbouring towns for family to visit on a regular basis, as well as promoting prosperity in industries as the industrial age was born. Most of us would have old photos of their cars over the last 40 years, but going back to original owner with names and places can be a tough jig saw to solve.

I recently had the opportunity to piece a large part of the history of our 1911 T Ford by visiting a clearing sale in April at Frankton near Truro. The piece of the puzzle I already had is a photo album obtained from the late Geoff Johnson, who we bought the car from in 1988.

Most of the album depicted the run-down state it was in when purchased by Reg Tilley in 1969 and showed progressive photos of its return to glory. The photo of most interest to me showed an elderly couple with stem looks sitting in the front with a lap rug with a "We have a motor car" satisfaction air about it. It was indeed a big deal to have a car in these early years, and purchasers had to be game in a way because there were no mechanics around and petrol stations didn't exist, with petrol sold in 4-gallon tins in a wooden crate at the local

store. Along with this, they had to learn how to drive this contraption and learn the workings of an internal combustion engine,



by comparison maintaining a horse where hay goes in one end and pollutants the other (no catalytic converters here) must have been rather daunting, unless you were rich enough to employ a chauffeur.



Anyway, back to the old pho-

to, I knew it was the Dieners in the T Model, probably when the car was new, so I looked forward to a visit to a clearing sale at the Diener farm in Frankton as two T Model Fords were in the sale, and hopefully more information and early photos of our car. The old T remained on the farm and several generations played cars on it resting in the shed, complete with brass lights and speedo, but no rear tub.

A few people in the Sporting Car Club tried to buy it, but Gerald Diener finally agreed to the swap of a new 1911 Roadster T for the old tourer, and this roadster was on offer at the sale. This car had seen better days, and was the same colour as our car, and sadly some of the bits apart from engine were from various year T's like the coil box, tailshaft etc. and seats were in vinyl rather than leather, but it bid to \$30,000.00 amazingly to a member of the Diener family, I am told. The other Model T on offer was a really nice Duncan body ute, 1924, with the most shredded tyres I have ever seen! When our T left the farm in 1969 minus rear tub, Reg Tilley found a matching rear tub with doors on a property dump near Ceduna and sitting nearby was a 1911 engine, just 80 numbers later than our car, so these T's would have been built on the same day. This engine was used in the roadster for the swap. The clearing sale represented five generations of the same family on the farm, and no one threw anything away, I was told by the great granddaughter whom I managed to track down on the day. I showed her the photos I had and we agreed to exchange photos she had by email and importantly put names to the people in the T. The people were William and Jane Deiner, William was a local farmer and secured a contract to build the school using local stone plentiful in the area. When complete, a teacher named Jane was sent to teach from early years up to Grade 7 pupils and subsequently met and married William next door.

At some stage in 1910 William placed an order for a Model T Ford, and his great granddaughter showed me a handwritten note of the occasion. During 1911 local people thought William was acting strangely, as he was building a new stone shed but wouldn't let on what was going in it, then one day along

comes a motor car with Bert Cheney from Duncan & Fraser in Adelaide. As was the custom, the driver stayed with the family for several days to show them how to drive and maintain this strange machine before catching a train back to Adelaide.

These sales guys sure earned



their commission. The Ford proved to be reliable and served as the family car for many years, before the back seat was removed to cart many loads of farm produce until it was used as a stationary engine driving a chaffcutter and corn crusher. One of the photos sent shows our T at the Morgan Station in 1923 next to a new Dodge, the T had been upgraded with front doors and later round guards on the rear. We also have another photo of it with these changes in Eudunda in the book "Hills, Valleys and Plains", a history of the area.

This is one car that the scrappies didn't get_____

I was wandering around the Bendigo swap meet about 5 years ago when I spied the Shell decals, they were perfect for my restoration project. John Fox made the globe for me about 45 years ago.

I have cleaned the Hi boy Golden Fleece which is original paint and the Castrol original oil bottle holder.

These projects have been a long time in the making but I am really happy with how they have turned out.

ROCKY ROAD

An excellent and easy Xmas treat.

250 gm dark chocolate 100 gm small baking marshmallows 100 spearmint leaves (chopped in half) 100gm glace cherries or lolly raspberries 1/2 cup roasted peanuts



Method

Melt chocolate and stir in other ingredients. Turn into lined pan (about 1/2 size lamin gton tin) or cake tin. Cut into small pieces when cold. Keep in fridge.

Cold Xmas pudding

3 dsp gelatine	3 tbsp cocoa(Cadbury Baking Cocoa is best)
3 cups milk	1 cup raisins
1/2 cup glace cherries	1 cup sugar (I cut this at least in half)
1/2 cup chopped nuts	1/2 cup currants
1/2 cup dates or figs	1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Method

Place milk, cocoa and gelatine in saucepan and stir until dissolved, but do not boil. Add sugar, stir to dissolve and remove to a cool place.

When mixture starts to thicken, add essence, fruit and nuts.

Turn into a mould rinsed in cold water and allow to set or set in individual glasses. Serve with cream or icecream.

Note : I use more glace fruit as an alternative, but is not everyone's taste. Use any combination of dried fruit that is liked.

I usually thicken the jelly in the freezer if in a hurry, but watch it as you don't want it solid, just thick at this stage. 11

It is also a nice touring car. My car was blue when I bought it, needing a little body work. I was lucky enough to have a mate who was a panel beater, interested in improving the look of my Daimler. He did a wonderful job, painting it Old English White. The upholstery was looking dowdy, so I replaced the seats with some out of an Alfa, which lifted the appearance on the inside as well. Jaguars have been a favourite as wedding cars, and I have helped out a few times when an extra car was needed for a wedding. My car has a factory fitted

Wabasco sunroof, which has been put to good use in wedding photos. Not many brides have been able to be photographed with their husband standing through the roof of their wedding car! I have attended a few All-British Days, and some Bay to Birdwood runs in the car, as well as our Club Runs. It sits with my Alfa Romeo, but I still do not have enough toy money to buy a Studebaker Avanti, which would complete my stable.


Whilst there were many highlights to speak of, it was just great seeing everyone support this magical event, even the rowdy bunch of locals on Rod's Hill.

Two guest speakers from See Differently arrived and were assisted by Bob Yates to get set up with the audio-visual equipment whilst the next items were being delivered.

11. CLUBROOMS MAINTENANCE COORDINATOR REPORT:

11.1. In Albert Jones's absence, the Secretary delivered Albert's report: The kitchen cupboard locks are on order, the hand sanitiser dispenser needs to be re-fixed to the wall (fell off), the Kitchen door stopper needs to be re-visited, the Falcon Car Club's pie warmer needs felt pads on the Kitchen benchtop; two Club owned fire extinguishers surplus to statutory requirements at Fawk Reserve Hall have been relocated to Croydon and the Exit Plan for Fawk Reserve Hall has been prepared and the Club will enact once the Council has advised a termination date.

12. TREASURER'S REPORT:

- 12.1. The Treasurer reported that he was in a state of transition to the role and unable to provide a report at this meeting; The documentation for the bank will be lodged next week; He will present a report at the next General Meeting.
- 12.2. David Carver reported that the 2023/24 Financials had been audited and going forward, the Club needs to be mindful of what it is able to do within the scope of the tax laws.

13. PROJECT MANAGER'S REPORT:

- 13.1. John Eastick updated members on progress since the last General Meeting: This is the fourth month of meetings here at Croydon; Defects still being discovered, and various ones are being attended too. With the air conditioners, the matter has been escalated to arrange a meeting between the Council, the building design team and the Builder and Subcontractor to rectify the problem: Builder's Clean not yet done: Referencing the gueries and/or actions at the last General Meeting: 1. HWS tariff: This building has 'time of use' metering and investigation has identified that the HWS has an onboard timer. The HWS has now been programmed to start up and finish during the day using solar power; 2. Electricity bill: The AGL bill has been interrogated and is in order; 3. Venetians: Committee considering other options, and the Council will not allow fixings to black anodized frames; 4. Urn left on: Coincidently, the urn cacked itself and has been replaced. Clubs have been advised and signage has been installed. All kitchen circuits turn off when building armed; Circuits: When building armed, all GPOs, lights, oven, stove top, rangehood and AV are isolated except fridge GPOs. Storeroom GPOs and GPOs under TV and along eastern wall. When building unarmed, lights do not turn back on but all GPOs, oven, stove top, rangehood and AV are restored, including in a turned-on mode if that is how they were left, albeit inadvertedly. Air conditioners are on their own timers; Lease: 2nd version received and commented upon and back with Council; Fit-out; Committee working through items and receiving pricing and proceeding with purchases. Of the various window and door treatment options, the Committee has decided to apply film to the windows and doors to the Meeting Room and samples are attached to the eastern window for members to comment tonight; Small numbers of members have been here more recently for defined tasks on seven occasions, being 5, 10, 12, 19, 25 and 30 September and 1 October; Propose Monday 14 October and Monday 4 November for next Working Bees; Fawk Reserve Hall: Awaiting feedback from Council about the outcomes of the Eol process and the Committee has a position about how to respond. This feedback will dictate what is required of the Club to be removed and stay and when.
- 13.2. Discussion ensured about the functionality of the stainless-steel urinal trough after concerns were raised by Rod Hills and Bob Yates on behalf of Rosa the Cleaner. It was suggested that stainless steel skirts be installed each side of the trough to protect the walls.



TINKERING WITH BOB


Keeping the rear axle key in its proper place when installing the rear wheel can sometimes be a chore if you are using the other than new components. Ideally the key should be a "Brass Hammer fit" in the slot on the rear axle taper. However, with new parts at a premium these days, some looseness seems to be the acceptable thing.

This looseness can, on occasions, cause one to lose his cool, Some T Ford Owners have come up with a good answer that seems to satisfy the installer. With the key properly located and secured in the axle slot, "Keyway" a 1/16" inch hole through the key and 1/16" of an inch into the bottom of the keyway. Inserting a piece of wire or small welding rod into the aligned holes keeps the key in its proper place. It is then no problem to place the hub and wheel onto the axle shaft correctly.

Several things one must remember. If your key is not in near perfect condition, don't replace with key stock available at most hardware stores. Most of their stuff is designed for use on lawn mower flywheels etc and is quite brittle and designed to shear when you hit a stone or other hard objects. This will hardly do for a rear axle key. A good test is to try to file or hacksaw the key, and if neither will touch it, do not use it.

As the taper of an old axle and hub will hardly ever mate perfectly when replacing the hub, it is advisable to use a good quality anti seize compound on the taper as well as the thread on the axle. This will prevent galling and make the removal a lot easier should it be required later. It is easy to exceed the stretch limits when a thread lubricant, so be extremely careful when tighten-

ing the axle nut. Do not overdo it! If using a torque wrench, 45 to 50 Foot Pounds is sufficient, "61Nm to 68Nm", also making sure the hole in the axle lines up with the slots in the nut so the split pin can be installed.



POWER(LESS) STEERING FOR, A MODEL T FORD

At a gathering of Model T Ford owners, they were discussing a front axle that was being overhauled by a member. Before heading their own ways, they realised they just might have discovered a trick to make a Model T Ford steering much easier to operate.

The front axle that was being refurbished had seen a lot of service and before the fitting of new kingpins could be installed, the holes of the axle yoke had to be line bored and bushed back to the original size. The flats at the top were badly worn and the top one was cupped. It was at this point that the group set about to seek a way to lessen the load on the spindle bushings and ease up the steering.

You need to find an engineering company to machine the two surfaces parallel to each other with a 0.140" clearance between the axle yoke surface and the spindle bushings, see drawing. Why the 0.140" clearance, you ask? At a local bearing supplier, a roller thrust bearing and two thrust washers that were 0.140" thick. One bearing and two thrust washers are used between the top of the spindle and the axle on each side, having the following part numbers, Torrington bearings, #2 - NTA - 815, 0.0781 thick, \$9.08 each plus GST. Torrington Thrust Washers, #4 - TRA - 815, 0.030 thick, \$3.52 each plus GST.

The above items are available from, Gardner Bearings Pty Ltd, 2/134 Pt Wakefield Road, Cavan, South Australia, 08 8260 7555.

If the gap exceeds the listed 0.140, thicker Thrust Washers are available, TRB - 815, 0.063 thick, \$6.85 each plus GST and TRC - 815, 0.095 thick, \$7.28 each plus GST.

Prices quoted are from the above listed business, prices could vary from other organisations

The complete set of two bearings and four thrust washers will cost approximately \$ 40.00

Once installed, they look like a steel washer, just slightly analler than the spindle bushing Flange, hardly noticeable to the untrained eye. Once the front axle is repainted it will not be noticed at all.

Place oil in the oil cup on the king-

pin, so that it puts oil into the bear-

ing before running down the bushing.


